Danish Honor Given To Beame and Duke

Mayor Beame and Public Events Commissioner Angier Biddle Duke may now address each other—and be addressed as — Commander. Both received that Danish rank Wednesday in the Order of the Dannebrog, named for the Danish flag. Consul-General Erik Krog-Meyer presented the decorations at Gracie Mansion in an advanced celebration of Queen Margrethe's coming visit here and in recognition of Mr. Duke's 1968-69 service as Ambassador to Denmark.
