

KISSINGER ACCUSED ON U.N. CHINA SHIFT

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WASHINGTON, May 27 (UPI)

—A former deputy director of the Central Intelligence Agency told Congress today that President Richard M. Nixon and Henry A. Kissinger undermined State Department efforts in 1971 to save Nationalist China's seat at the United Nations.

The former intelligence official, Ray S. Cline, told a House International Relations subcommittee that Mr. Nixon and Mr. Kissinger, who was then the President's national security adviser, did not take Secretary of State William P. Rogers "or anybody else into their confidence on their China policy."

Instead, Mr. Cline said, they let Mr. Rogers continue planning campaigns to save the Chinese Nationalist seat at the United Nations even while Mr. Kissinger made secret trips to Peking with White House agreement to the admission of mainland China to the world body.

Mr. Cline also said President Ford had been strongly pressed by the Kissinger State Department to grant full diplomatic recognition to Peking during his recent official trip there.

"I feel he postponed the move," Mr. Cline said.

The subcommittee chairman, Lester Wolff of Nassau and Clement J. Zablocki, of Wisconsin, both Democrats, expressed concern that Mr. Ford would recognize Peking and sever ties with Nationalist China after the Presidential elections.
