

Wyman Says He's Cleared In Farkas-Nixon Case

CONCORD, N.H. (AP)—Former Representative Louis C. Wyman said that he had been informed that he would not be prosecuted in connection with the arrangements for an ambassadorial appointment.

Mr. Wyman had been under investigation for his self-acknowledged role as the middleman in the appointment of Ruth Farkas, a wealthy New York woman, as ambassador to Luxembourg. Mrs. Farkas was appointed after contributing \$300,000 to the re-election campaign of President Nixon in 1972.

Mr. Wyman said yesterday that Special Prosecutor Charles Ruff had told him "no charges will be brought against me in the Farkas case."

The former Republican Congressman complained, however, that the controversy surrounding the Farkas investigation had produced "wild smears made again and again in two political campaigns." He was defeated a year ago by a Democrat, John A. Durkin, in a special election in New Hampshire for a Senate seat.

Mrs. Farkas recently resigned her ambassadorship.
