DEC 2 Alexander Butterfield has at last found a new job. Mr. Butterfield, as a White House aide, first revealed to the Senate Watergate committee, on July 16, 1973, that President Nixon's Oval Office conversations had been taped. The information helped set in motion a chain of events that led to the President's resignation, but Mr. Butterfield, a longtime public servant, lost his job. Some months ago he com-plained that although he had sent replained that although he had sent resumes to dozens of companies, he had been unable to find employment. But yesterday, it was announced that Mr. Butterfield had been named executive vice president of the International Air Service Company Ltd., a California-based concern that leases flight crew services and air charter services, and is engaged in aircraft sales and maintenance. Mr. Butterfield is a former official of the Federal Aviation Administration.
