ALL OF LOS ANGELES PLEDGES LOYALTY TO FDR -- MINORITY RALLIES 'ROUND LINDBERGH

Tension rose to fevered pitch last week in Los Angeles, when the vast majority of its citizens pledged support to President Roosevelt's Foreign Policy, while a small minority shouted themselves hoarse in approval of Charles A. Lindbergh's plea for appeasement.

On Friday evening, June 20th, 20,000 people jammed the famous Hollywood Bowl. They cheered Lindbergh, they booed and hissed England -- but there was not a single boo for Germany and her Axis partners. There was much critical talk of British propagandists, but no mention of German propaganda nor of the Fifth Column. Many curiosity-seeking attendants were disappointed, and deplored the lack of honest patriotism, while others in the audience -- well known for their past subversive activities -- were jubilant over the "success" of the meeting. They listened to an ominous warning by the Lone Eagle -- reminiscent of the statement made by Adolf Hitler when, in 1924, he was tried for treason by the highest German court -- that, to quote the American flyer verbatim:

Some day, in the not distant future, the men who are responsible for this (the deliberate attempt to misinform and confuse our people) will be called to account by an aroused and enlightened nation. The attempt to involve our country in war by subterfuge and propaganda is not a crime to be passed over lightly.

While the America First Committee was busily preparing for the Lindbergh rally, the city of Los Angeles observed "Loyalty-Unity Day", proclaimed by Mayor Fletcher Bowron and initiated by the American Legion.

Participating in the Loyalty-Unity Day were 10,000 American Legion workers, the Boy Scouts, and the Women's Ambulance Defense Corps. Literally tons of pledges signed by thousands of Los Angeles citizens (reproduction on this page) are now on their way to Washington, D.C., following the largest mass demonstration of loyalty and unity for defense yet to be held in this nation.

Announcing this drive, Dee Holder, Commander of the 17th District of the American Legion, said:

Attempts are being made to spread dissension among us and to create false impressions that the American people are not solidly behind their freely chosen public servants. It is fitting, therefore, that the American Legion should invite the people of this community to join with its members in a simple pledge of American loyalty and unity.

Organizations cooperating in the movement were the Los Angeles Board of Education, which distributed pledges to all students (for their parents' signatures), the Motion Picture Producers Association, the National Unity Crusade, the Junior Chamber of Commerce, the Downtown Businessmen's Association, Committees from the A.F. of L. and CIO, and the Independent Theatre Owners Association.

"A Nazi Is Not a Nazi" -- Says America First

To prevent any ruffled feelings on the part of truly sincere Americans who came to hear Lindbergh, the America First Committee displayed a sign (reproduction on page 5), stating that Nazis, Communists and Fascists were not wanted. However, that this was mere camouflage was apparent to those who have watched America First meetings in the past months. Nazi elements were just as conspicuous at the Lindbergh Rally as at all previous America First meetings. NRS of servers, who covered the meeting, reported as follows:

- #1. Under the direction of M. Gallagher of the American Honest Money Legion (local Coughlin organization), six women sold copies of Father Coughlin's Social Justice. The Coughlin crowd was well represented, and led by H. J. Whitmore, head of the organization; George A. Nusang, official distributing agent for Social Justice, currently engaged in a subscription drive from which he hopes to obtain a free trip to Royal Oak, Mich.; Mrs. Blanche Duquette, vender of Social Justice.
- #2. German atmosphere was supplied in abundance by the active participation of Hermann M. Schwinn, West Coast Führer of the German-American Bund until he lost his American citizenship; Hans Diebel, proprietor of the Aryan Book Store, located at the German House in Los Angeles; Valentine Bibo, Bund Stormtrooper; Reinhold Kusche, former Stormtroop leader; Frank Weller, Bund member; Mr. and Mrs. Leo Pilzer, Bund members; Dr. H. A. Gebhardt, head of the German-American League and attorney for the German Consulate; F. K. Ferenz, exhibitor of Nazi propaganda pictures; Bruce Tarkington Dowden, exposed in NRS #136 as Ferenz' front man; Mr. and Mrs. James McBride, Bund members; Sam Faulk, Muriel Wiseman, Mrs. Koch, and Ray Bechtelheimer, frequent visitors at the German House; the four van Meter brothers, notorious for their Bund activities and for being official printers and photographers for the Bund; Mr. and Mrs. Ernest Link, prominent Bund sympathizers; D. A. Rathbone, printer of Nazi literature; Roy Chase, Bund member and advocate of Nazi terrorism; Mr. and Mrs. William G. Moffett of Pasadena, formerly associated with the Bund and with the Coughlin organization; William Hunt, collaborator of the erstwhile national Bund leader, Fritz Kuhn; Kenneth Alexander, leading Silver Shirter in Southern California; B. M. Meller, White Russian pro-Nazi. As predicted last week by NRS, reprints of Lindbergh's "Letter to the American People", gotten out by the American Freedom Association, were distributed by Bundit Larry Griffith.
- #3. Miscellaneous, rabble-rousing, agitation-spreading attendants included William P. Williams, North Hollywood High School teacher, who preaches subversivism to his pupils; T. W. Hughes, organizer of the Nazi front organization known as "Save America First"; Dr. L. H. Wollendorf, an active agitator at all anti-democracy meetings; Mrs. Faith McCullough (picture on page 5), former secretary to Mrs. Leslie Fry, who was tied up directly with the German Propa-

ganda Ministry, both exposed in NRS #35; Nellie McCray, active in many pro-Nazi groups; Mrs. Laura Curry, President of the Los Angeles Women's Forum, where the spurious "Protocols of the Elders of Zion" is accepted as a bible; Mrs. Goldie Leyton, co-chairwoman of the Women's Forum; Mr. Windhorst, frequent speaker at the Women's Forum; Mrs. J. Henry Orme, associate of Mrs. McCullough; and Mr. and Mrs. P. P. Lewis, active followers of "Save America First".

#4. The "Copperheads" were also there. Ellis O. Jones, founder and president of the National Copperhead Association (exposed in NRS #145) and close associate of local Nazi leaders, distributed cards attacking The Los Angeles Times (reproduction on page 5). Jones has been busy rounding up membership in all parts of the country, appealing especially to the "Ham-and-Eggers", Townsendites, and the general lunatic fringe. He sent appeals to his followers in nearby towns to come to the Lindbergh Rally. Some of them answered his call, among them a contingent from San Diego, which arrived with signs, proudly proclaiming that they are "San Diego Copperheads" (picture on page 5).

#5. One NRS reporter counted 65 elderly men and women on the grounds of the Hollywood Bowl, distributing "Mankind United" handbills, announcing the showing of "Dealers in Death", a propaganda-for-peace film, fully exposed in NRS 150. Well known Nazis made it their business to engage strangers in conversation, and produced copies of the new U.S. Nazi bible, "The Octopus" (exposed in NRS #140). These prospects were told to write to Charles B. Hudson of Omaha, Nebr., for copies.

"Loyalty-Unity Pledge Is Treason" -- Say Nazis

Early Thursday morning, the first printed copies of the "Loyalty-Unity Pledge" appeared in Los Angeles. That afternoon, the Women's Activities Group of the America First Committee held its regular weekly meeting at the headquarters on Wilshire Boulevard. Mrs. Orme, who presided, attacked the Loyalty-Unity program, and advised her listeners to sign the pledge when asked, but to first create a stir and raise the question: "Isn't this a pledge of allegiance to dictatorship?"

On Thursday evening, Nazis, in full force, mingled with members of America First at the regular weekly meeting. A. Dwight Nims, frequent speaker for America First, claimed that he had received inside information to the effect that Legionnaires were planning to attend the Lindbergh Rally in a body, and to create such a disturbance that the meeting would be broken up. His "revelation" was greeted by shouts from the audience: "Let them come....we'll handle 'em all right!"

A Los Angeles public school teacher in the audience immediately arose, frantically waved a copy of the Loyalty-Unity Pledge, and exclaimed:

This is some of the propaganda dished out in our schools. The kids in my school were told to take these home and have their parents sign. I am thoroughly provoked by this vicious propaganda, and as soon as summer vacation starts, I shall devote all my strength and time to fight such outrageous procedures.

After the meeting had adjourned, a number of Nazis and America Firsters got together to discuss plans for counteracting the Loyalty-Unity campaign. Early Friday morning, their strategy became apparent. Telephone squads went into action, bombarding the Board of Education with protests in order to cajole the Board into withdrawing its support from the Loyalty-Unity drive. In

the early afternoon, the subversivists learned that the Board's cooperation was enlisted through Ben S. Beery, prominent Los Angeles attorney and active American Legion leader. Within two hours, Beery received no less than fifteen telephone calls, threatening: "We'll get you, you dirty ----!" "I'll come over and shoot you!" "You traitor, you'll get what's coming to you!"

In spite of such obstructionism, the Loyalty-Unity campaign was a tremendous success. As this NRS release goes to press, Legion H.Q. is still a beehive of activity while Los Angeles newspapers report in unison:

Seven out of eight families in L. A. sign loyalty pledge



Los Angeles was loyal yesterday. It was united behind the men striving to preserve the way of our country.

Seven out of eight families in greater Los Angeles signed pledges of loyalty and unity passed out by the American Legion to reaffirm the people's faith in their government during this emergency.

Comdr. Dee Holder of the Legion saw in the demonstration a repudiation of axis criticisms that "democracies are weak."

"It is frequently said," Holder explained, "that democratic citizens cannot act quickly and in an organized and united way—that only whipcracking, goose stepping and totalitarianism can get men, women and children together efficiently for a mass demonstration of united sentiment and action in behalf of their government."

His answer was a mountainous stack of more than 2,000,000 signed loyalty pledges which were sent off last night to President Roosevelt.

"All of them," Holder said, "were signed freely by free men. We were glad to afford the opportunity for inarticulate people to express themselves as being in favor of their government."

Early pledges signed by 800 dignitaries, including Mayor Fletcher Bowron, church and labor leaders and civic officials, were sent off by plane so the president would receive them before the day was out.

Throughout the day others were signed in hotel lobbies, theaters, restaurants — wherever people gather. In fact, film director Cecil B. DeMille stopped production on his latest picture in order that cast and crew might sign pledges.

"Indications," said Holder, "point toward the movement sweeping the entire United States."
