

Author Accuses Dallas Police

A British publisher has declared he will print a book next month by author Joachim Joesten accusing high Dallas police officials of complicity in the assassination of President Kennedy.

The publisher, Peter Dawnay, said Joesten's book, titled "Oswald." The truth, goes further than other books on the subject by naming the actual criminals involved in the assassination. Joesten wrote another book, titled "Oswald: Assassin or Fall Guy," in 1964.

Dawnay said Joesten invited the officials named in the book to sue him for libel so that the charges could be aired in court.

He said recent statements by New Orleans District Attorney Jim Garrison bore out the accuracy of Joesten's book.

Dawnay said much of the book was based on the theory there was a "false Oswald" — a double for Lee Harvey Oswald, who was blamed for the killing and was shot by the late Jack Ruby.

The publisher said the false Oswald worked for Ruby and spent much time traveling around Dallas leaving false clues that would later implicate the real Oswald.

Dawnay said "there was not one plot but two, one superimposed on the other."

He said the book showed Ruby and the false Oswald started out by plotting to kill Texas Governor John Connally, but this plot was absorbed into an anti-Kennedy plot inspired by "oil tycoons,

retired generals, segregationists, and other right wing elements."

He said it also asserted that Dallas police officials framed Oswald and distorted evidence submitted to the Warren commission that investigated the assassination.

Dawnay said Joesten, author of 26 books, had worked on the Kennedy case since the assassination and uncovered "incredible" new material from the 26 volumes of hearings that backed up the Warren report.

"The Warren commission stands condemned on its own evidence," Dawnay said.
