In the Papers: Backing For Oswald Theory

Washington observer David Lawrence concurs with this column that JFK's slayer was evening things up with Gov. Connally, and unintentionally shot the President . . . "The real mystery," says Lawrence, "is why there has been so much suspicion engendered that someone contrived with Oswald as an accomplice to commit the crime. For there is clear evidence of the grudge of one individual."

Harrison Salisbury, one of the finest reporters in the nation, was so expert at getting the facts straight, they promoted him . . . He will chief the probe . . . The new spaper's task force "will go back over all areas of doubt and hope to eliminate them."

We also trust Pulitzer Prize winner Salisbury will find out why Oswald (with a record of defection to Russia and who threatened Connally) was permitted to be at large in Dallas on the day the governor rode in the same car with JFK.
