#### Editor of Stern Vows to Run **Original Manchester Text**

ecial to The New York Times BONN, Dec. 23 — The editorin-chief of West Germany's 'illustrated magazine Stern said today he would ignore demands by Look magazine and begin serializing the original test of "The Death of a President" Jan. 15.

Henri Nannen, the editor, said by telephone that Look told him in a message yesterday that it was sending Stern revised proofs of the book about the assassination of President Ken-

lished and demanded that the original proofs of the book by William Manchester be des-Mr.<sup>10</sup> Namen added that he understood Look was threaten-ing legal action to prevent Stern from publishing the con-troversial book.

Look agreed to delete por-tions of the text after Mrs. John F. Kennedy objected to the original version on the ground that it contained refer-ences that related to the per-sonal life of herself or her chif-dren. dren.

He noted that the Look tele-gram also asked that no ad-vertising that used pictures of living members of the Kennedy family be distributed. Mr. Nannen said that he had first looked at the original text of Mr. Manchester's book in London and had paid \$72,000 for the serialization rights, which he believes is the highest sum ever paid for a book by a sum ever paid for a book by German magazine. a
