

Jackie Wrote K On Fate of World

NEW YORK — (AP) — Mrs. John F. Kennedy wrote Premier Nikita Khrushchev before she left the White House that he and President Kennedy were allied in a determination that the world would not be blown up.

Mrs. Kennedy said she was certain President Johnson would continue her husband's policy which she termed one of control and restraint.

A spokesman for the Kennedy family confirmed today the letter will be in the Look magazine serialization of William Manchester's book, "The Death of a President."

Manchester also says in the serialization, according to a person who has read it:

- He agrees with the theory of the Warren Commission that Gov. John Connally of Texas, who was riding with Kennedy in the Dallas motorcade Nov. 22, 1963, was hit by the same bullet that went through Kennedy's body.

Connally has expressed the opinion he and Kennedy were hit by different bullets.

- Newsman Charles Bartlett told Defense Secretary Robert S. McNamara he had

heard from President Kennedy that he was to be secretary of state in the second term.

Bartlett said today he did not care to comment.

(Arthur M. Schlesinger Jr., a former adviser to President Kennedy, wrote recently that Kennedy had decided in 1963 to replace Dean Rusk as secretary of state after the 1964 election).

- Manchester says that once Rusk had left, Robert F. Kennedy, then attorney general, would ask to be assistant secretary for inter-American affairs.

- Kennedy was taking French lessons, determined that when he met President Charles De Gaulle he would not only speak to him in his own language but negotiate in it.

- President Kennedy's Bible, used by Federal Judge Sarah Hughes when she administered the presidential oath to Lyndon B. Johnson is missing.

A man whom Judge Hughes did not know, but whom she thought a security official, asked for it and disappeared.
