Dallas Notes JFK Death Anniversary

Dallas

About 300 persons gathered in a cold wind at Kennedy Memorial Plaza yesterday for 30 minutes of music and prayer and to eulogize late President John F. Kennedy one day ahead of the tenth anniversary of his assassination.

Mrs. J. B. Shaw, an elderly lady who brought a nurse with her and sat with bowed head in a folding chair at a corner of the memorial, summed up in 17 words what a Catholic bishop, a rabbi, a Protestant clergyman and Mayor Wes Wise were to say later.

"I had a special regard for President Kennedy," Mrs. Shaw said shakily. "He was the finest of men—a great leader."

Wise, who was not much more than a block from the actual assassination site, was held yesterday instead of on No-

There was a time when November was a festive month for the Kennedy family, one of gay birthday parties and hard-fought political races, Thanksgiving gatherings at Hyannis Port and rowdy afternoons of touch football.

But today, the tenth anniversary of President John Fitzgerald Kennedy's assassination in Dallas, members of his family will remember him in their own private ways.

Their celebration of Thanksgiving will be a muted one.

Jacqueline Onassis, the president's elegant widow who remarried six years after his death, is expected to spend the weekend with her two children in New York or at her home in southern

Massachusetts on November 22 because of the anniversary's having fallen on Thanksgiving Day.

"Ten years have not blunt-

ed his accomplishments . . . "They have not eased the shock," Mayor Wise said as he laid a wreath of white chrysanthemums and red
