

**KENNEDY DISCLOSES
CONVENTION MOVES**

BOSTON, Oct. 11 (AP) — Senator Edward M. Kennedy says Democratic leaders knew he was not a serious for the Democratic Presidential nomination, but supporters of the minority plank on Vietnam asked him to delay a public disavowal of the movement to draft him.

"As long as it looked like I might be in the wings, some thought it would help the minority plank. My own inclination is sort of to doubt it," the Massachusetts Democrat said in an interview.

The interview, with Richard H. Stewart of The Boston Globe's Washington bureau, was published in The Globe today.

Asked why he waited until the third day of the Democratic National Convention to end the movement to draft him, Senator Kennedy said: "I thought I had made it clear

that I didn't have any intention ... I had talked privately to Democratic leaders."

Mr. Kennedy said the possibility of running for President this year was "never a serious question in my mind" because of "a lot of reasons, primarily personal."

After his brother Robert F. Kennedy's bid for the nomination was cut short by his assassination in Los Angeles, Edward Kennedy was first prominently mentioned as a possible Vice-Presidential nominee. He eliminated himself from consideration, however, with a statement on July 26.

Youths Get \$4,000 at A.&P.

Four teen-agers robbed an A. & P. supermarket at 325 Cumberland Street at Greene Avenue in Brooklyn of \$4,000 at 9:30 A.M. yesterday. While one youth herded 12 employes and customers to the rear of the store during the 10-minute hold-up, the others emptied the safe and cash registers. The store had been robbed of \$3,000 three weeks ago.
