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Miss Kopechne's Body Flown To Pennsylvania for Funeral

Scranton, Pa., July 20—
The body of Mary Jo Kopechne, who drowned early yesterday when a car driven by Senator Edward M. Kennedy plunged into a pond near Martha's Vineyard, was flown here in a chartered plane today as aides to the Massachusetts Senator completed arrangements for her funeral and burial.

The body was taken to the Kielty Funeral Home in Plymouth, a small town just outside Wilkes-Barre, where the 28-year-old political campaign worker was born.

A requiem mass will be sung at 9:30 A.M. on Tuesday at St. Vincent's Roman Catholic Church in Plymouth by Msgr.

It was uncertain today whether Senator Kennedy iwould atend the funeral. His Joctor said he had suffered a light concussion in the accident 'in Chappaquiddick Island near dgartown, Mass., on Martha's 'ineyard, and he was reported easting today at his summer's ome in Hyannis Port, Mass.

Miss Kopechne was a B-plus student throughout school, her mother, who is 51, said in an interview. At college, she majored in business administration, and for a year after her graduation she taught that subject on a volunteer basis at the Mission of St. Jude in Montgomery, Ala.

Late in 1963, she left for Washington, where she took a job as an aide to Senator George Smathers of Florida.

"We don't know how Mary Jo landed her jobs," Mrs. Kopechne said. "I guess it was just her personality. She was a very pleasing girl."

When Robert When Robert F. Kennedy was elected to the Senate from New York in 1964, Miss Kopechne took a job in his Washington office. She worked in Delaware, Kentucky and Pennsylvania during Robert Kennedy's campaign for the Democratic Presidential nomination last year.

"She stayed on Robert Kennedy's staff until the day they closed down the doors, following his assassination," Mrs. Kopechne said.
