## Kennedy Still Is Favorite

Senator Edward Kennedy remains the overwhelming favorite of California's rank and file Democrats for the 1976 presidential nomina-

For the Republican presidential nomination, Gover-nor Ronald Reagan is favored by this state's Republicans but Vice President Gerald Ford is narrowing the gap.

The youngest Kennedy brother maintains a very large margin of preference in California over a field of nine other Democrats who have received prominent mention as possible 1976 contenders. His brothers were also popular with the state's Democrats. Robert Kennedy, carried the 1968 Democratic presidential California primary, and al-though President John Kennedy did not run in the California primary election in 1960, he was preferred over a number of other Democrats in California Poll surveys taken at the time.

Senator Kennedy clearly outdistances Alabama Governor George Wallace by 42 per cent vs. 13 per cent. Farther down the scale, Senators Henry Jackson, Edinund Muskie and George McGovern follow at the 7 to 9 per cent level. Other possible candidates such as Senators Birch Bayh, Adlai Stevenson, III, Walter Mondale,

Lloyd Bentsen and Florida Governor Reuben Askew yet receive only nominal support for the nomination.

Some preference trends in the 1976 Democratic presidential nomination race found by The California Poll in its surveys of current public opinion in this state are shown below.

Among California Republicans, Ronald Reagan leads Vice President Ford, ex-New York Governor Nelson Rockefeller, Rockefeller, Senators Charles Percy and Howard Baker, and former Nixon cabinet members, John Connally and Elliot Richardson. The latest rankings compare with those taken November 1973 are shown below:

Despite Reagan's large following among this state's Republicans, he does not fare well when matched against each of the three

Reagan trails Kennedy 20 percentage points (56 per cent to 36 per cent and Jackson by 16 percentage points (52 per cent to 36 cent. He bests Wallace in a possible 1976 pairing 43 per cent to 38 per cent.

Both Ford and Rockefeller do better than Reagan does against the three leading Democrats. While they trail Democrats Kennedy and Jackson, their deficits are smaller than that of Reagan's. Ford and Rockefeller also do better against Wallace than does Reagan.

The primary reason for this is that Reagan does not command the same level of as Ford and Rockefeller do.
