HANS HERLIN resigned his job as managing editor of Molden, a large German publishing house, two years ago at the age of 48 to write his own first novel, Commemorations. A best seller in Germany, it will be published here by St. Martin's Press next month.

Teddy Times Two

IF ONE BOOK about Ted Kennedy is a good idea, two should be twice as good, right? That seems to be the theory at Norton, where Senator Ted Kennedy by Theo Lippman Jr. is scheduled for publication in January and a study by James Mac-Gregor Burns, tentatively titled The Legacy of Camelot and the Choice Before Americans, is scheduled for May.

Lippman, an editorial writer for the Baltimore Sun and author of political biographies of Spiro Agnew and Edmund Muskie, worked on his book for 15 months and had eight taped interviews with the senator as well as access to some of his files. Burns, whose advance from Norton is reportedly over \$100,000, has put aside a book on political leadership he is writing for Harper & Row but expects to resume work on it by the beginning of next

When Lippman heard about the Burns book, he fired off a protest to his editor, Evan Thomas, expressing the fear that, with two books competing with one another, both issued by the same publisher, the marketing and subsidiary rights of his book may be affected. George Brockway, president of Norton, insists that Lippman did a "really bangup job" and his book will be featured prominently on Norton's winter list. Fortunately, he said, the books "are several months apart and their thrust is quite different."
