Jackie and Children 'Still Need Protection'

Washington.

The authorization for the Secret Service to protect Jacqueline Kennedy is about to expire, and Treasury Secretary Henry Fowler asked Congress yesterday to extend it 15 months.

Fowler said that because Mrs. Kennedy and her children still are widely publicized, "they are sought out and subjected to annoyance by the idly curious" and also remain possible targets for the mentally deranged.

He noted that temporary authority for the Secret Service to protect them expires

on November 22, fourth anniversary of the assassination of the late President. Fowler suggested that Congress extend it to March 1, 1969, for possible further review at that time.

Cost of the protection service for Mrs. Kennedy and her children, Caroline and John, was not stated but Fowler was not stated but Fowler noted that the protection afforded her had been limited, at her request. He said the cost is less than that of the security provided, under permanent law, for former Presidents Eisenhower and Truman.

Kennedys' Protection Voted

WASHINGTON, Oct. 24 (UPI)—The House Judiciary Committee approved today a bill to continue Secret Service protection for Mrs. John F. Kennedy and her two children. The Treasury Department requested the extension—which would continue to March 1, 1969—because it said the family was still being pestered, nearly four years after the assassination of President Kennedy.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 7 (AP)—The Senate completed Congressional action today on a bill continuing Secret Service protection for Mrs. John F. Kennedy and her children until March 1, 1969.

The bill now goes to the White House for President Johnson's signature.

Sponsors said that Mrs. Kennedy had not asked for the continued protection, but that the Treasury Department felt it should be furnished because she still was a sought-after public figure. They estimated the annual cost at \$210,000.

The Senate acted by voice vote without debate.

Johnson Signs Bill to Continue Jackie's Guards

President Johnson yesterday signed a bill continuing Secret Service protection for Mrs. John F. Kennedy and her children until March 1, 1969.

The second two-year period in which the former First Lady has been given protection expires Thursday.

Mrs. Kennedy also receives from the Federal government an annual presidential widows' pension of \$10,000.

The Treasury Department has estimated the yearly cost of Secret Service protection for Mrs. Kennedy and her two children at \$210,000.
