

COUPLE WILL LIVE ON FIFTH AVENUE

Mrs. Kennedy's Cooperative Apartment Will Be Kept

Mrs. John F. Kennedy will maintain her cooperative apartment at 1040 Fifth Avenue after her marriage to Aristotle S. Onassis, according to Nancy Tuckerman, Mrs. Kennedy's secretary. Miss Tuckerman said the couple would later live there.

Miss Tuckerman also said that Mrs. Kennedy's two children, who accompanied their mother to Greece, were expected to be back in school in New York on Monday.

"The children will be going to the same schools and continuing to spend part of each summer in Hannisport," Miss Tuckerman said. "They will be back in time for school on Monday and hopefully they will be able to make up Friday's work."

Caroline, 10, is in the fifth grade at the Convent of the Sacred Heart. John, 7, recently entered the third grade at Col3 legiate School after transferring from St. David's.

Many Interests Here

Mr. Onassis has many business interests in the city but has not maintained a permanent residence here.

Miss Tuckerman said yesterday that she had spoken with Mrs. Kennedy earlier in the day but "it's night time there and I haven't heard anything since."

She said the children would be returning with the family party that accompanied Mrs. Kennedy when she left the city Thursday night on her flight to Greece.

On board the Olympic Air-

ways jet aircraft when it left the ramp at Kennedy Airport were Mr. and Mrs. Hugh D. Auchincloss, Mrs. Kennedy's mother and stepfather; Mr. Patricia Lawford and her daughter, Sidney; Mr. and Mrs. Stephen Smith; the two Kennedy children and several servants. The Boeing 707 was taken over by Mr. Onassis, who is an owner of the airline, for the eight-and-a-half-passengers who had been scheduled to board the aircraft were shifted to a later flight.

Unobtrusive Hat Likely

There was no official announcement of what Mrs. Kennedy planned to wear for the ceremony. Friends here thought it likely that her dress would be a design by Valentino, the Roman couturier who has been favored by her in recent years. It was also expected that she would wear an unobtrusive hat, probably from Adolfo of New York. Half a dozen trunks and cases were brought down from the Kennedy apartment shortly before Mrs. Kennedy emerged for her drive to the airport Thursday night.

Although news of the impending marriage had been announced almost 24 hours earlier, late yesterday afternoon many of Mrs. Kennedy's friends still expressed their surprise.

"I am absolutely floored," said Mrs. Claiborne Pell of Newport, R. I., the wife of the Democratic junior Senator from Rhode Island.

Mrs. Pell, who has known Mrs. Kennedy "for ages" and was a childhood friend of hers, added, "I had absolutely no idea at all but I'm glad she's marrying again and hope she'll be very happy."

"There aren't too many people in Newport now, but those I've seen are surprised," she said. "I don't think anybody thought of him."

Mrs. Kennedy and Mr. Onassis "have many things in common," said Franklin D. Roosevelt Jr., who has known the couple for many years.
