Jackie Onassis Shuts N.Y. Office

Jacqueline Onassis has closed the office she maintained in New York mainly to handle mail received after the assassination of her first husband, President John F. Kennedy. "When Mrs. Onassis went to Greece it was decided there was no longer a necessity to have an office," her former social secretary, Nancy Tuckerman, explained yesterday. "The mail is not sufficient to warrant an office. She's a private citizen now."

Miss Tuckerman has taken a job with Olympic Airways, owned by the former first lady's husband, Aristotle Onassis.

Actors Offer Reward

Peter Sellers and fellow actors have posted a \$25,000 reward for information leading to conviction of the killer of actress Sharon Tate.

"Someone must have knowledge or suspicions they are withholding or may be afraid to reveal," Sellers said yesterday in London. Two of his associates in offering the reward are Warren Beatty and Yul Brynner.

Miss Tate and other persons were in California last year.

Fortas Aim Seen

The Washington Post says former Supreme Court Justice Abe Fortas plans to reenter the practice of law in the nation's capital this autumn.

Fortas resigned from the court last May 15 under fire for his dealings with the family foundation of financier Louis E. Wolfson, later convicted of violating the federal securities law.

The ex-justice formerly was a member of the Washington law firm of Arnold & Porter.
