## Jackie Is Near Tears in Court

NEW YORK — (AP) — Jacqueline Onassis, nearly in tears, has testified that photographer Ronald E. Galella hovered around her during the funeral of Richard Cardinal Cushing in Boston.

Galella kept "getting very close to members of my family and me," Mrs. Onassis said yesterday as she continued to recite occasions when the photographer allegedly leaped about, jumped up and down, chased, frightened or embarrassed her.

Mrs. Onassis' voice faltered as she watched projected slides of the late Roman Catholic prelate who performed the ceremony for her marriage to John F. Kennedy.

"I loved him," she said of Cushing.

She was testifying for the second straight day in the trial of Galella's \$1.3 million suit charging her with harrassment and her countersuit for a permanent order to force him to stay a certain distance from her.

The witness said Galella has followed her to the island of Skorpios in Greece and to the islands of Capri and Ischia in Italy. Sometimes he would shadow her and her guests all day long, she said.

On one occasion, Mrs. On assis testified, Galella came so close to her while she was buying stockings at Bonwit Teller's that she said to him: "You can't take a picture from there."

The freelance photographer also disturbed her son John during a play rehearsal at his school, she said, and made her daughter Caroline cry when he bumped her on a tennis court in Central Park.

Another time, she said, she saw Galella and a girl begin taking pictures of her from a taxicab outside her Fifth Avenue apartment.

"They were laughing at me and taking pictures from the taxi," she testified, and Galella shouted to the girl at one point, "Get her! Get her!"

The girl "was laughing and yelling, 'Isn't this fun?'" Mrs. Onassis stated, adding that she didn't remember how she got home because "I was a wreck."

Federal Judge Irving Ben Cooper is weighing both suits in one juryless trial. Galella has rested his case. Mrs. Onassis now is testifying as the plaintiff in her suit.
