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SACRAMENTO, Calif. AP — The legislature sent to Gov. Ronald Reagan Tuesday a bill designed to prevent commercialization of photographs taken during the autopsy on the body of assassinated Sen. Robert F. Kennedy.

Reagan has expressed sympathy with the

purpose of the bill.

There was no Senate debate Tuesday on the measure which prevents the reproduction of any photograph taken of a body during an autopsy.

Exempted are pictures made for medical and scientific research and education.

The bill declares it state policy "to protect individuals and families against unconscionable invasions of their privacy."

There was no direct reference to the Kennedy family, but sponsors of the measure said it was introduced on behalf of friends of the Kennedys who feared the photographs might be published in magazines which deal in sensational matter.

Los Angeles Dist. Atty. Evelle Younger said that unless the law was changed, any of 200 photographs taken during the Kennedy autopsy in Los Angeles in June could be reproduced and published after they are introduced in the trial of Sirhan Bishara Sirhan.

Sirhan is scheduled to go on trial Nov. 1 on a charge of murder in the fatal shooting of the New York senator as he left a California primary election victory celebration early in the morning after the June 4 election.

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
