Sirhan Trial 250

LOS ANGELES AP - Sirhan Enshara Sirhan apparently will
be tried on the bagis that he alone murdered Sen. Robert F.
Kennedy.
The chief deputy district attorney, Lynn D. Compton, said
at a hearing Monday that the investigation of other possible suspects
"is negative and of little value to anyone." This was the first
public statement along those lines by the prosecution.
The defense requested—and received—a delay from Nov. 1
to Dec. 9 for the start of the trial.
Monday's hearing, lasting 71 minutes, was the seventh and longest
for Sirhan, 24, a Jordanian immigrant. Sitting in a padded
chair, he leaned over from time to time to confer with his attorney,
Russell E. Parsons.
His only statement came when Superior Court Judge Herbert
V. Walker asked if he would waive the statutory time
for his case to be heard. "Yes, sir, I will," Sirhan replied
swiftly, in a low voice.
Sirhan again wore a tieless blue shirt with gray slacks lighter
than ones he has worn before. He waved to his mother, Mary, and
brother Mumir, 21, who sat across the improvised courtroom near
his heavily guarded jail cell.
In asing the trial postponement Farsons said another defense
lawyer, still unidentified, remains involved in another case.
Parsons later told newsmen he understand a New Yerk attorney,
known as "tone of the ablest in America," also will join the
defense, making it a three—man team Parsons aid the New Yorker
had volunteered but refused to identify him.
Parsons told newsmen "we have seen no evidence of a
conspiracy," and said Sirhan does have a valid defense.
Kennedy was fatally wounded just after proclaiming victory in
Californaa's Democratic primary to a crowd of supporters.
