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LANE FILES PROTEST ON F.B.I. QUESTIONING

Former Assemblyman Mark Lane said yesterday that he had sent a complaint against agents of both the Federal Bureau of Investigation and the Secret Service to the Presidential commission investigating President Kennedy's assassination.

Mr. Lane said that two F.B.I. agents had accosted him on the street yesterday morning, demanding to know if he had documents from the agency's files on the alleged assassin, Lee Harvey Oswald. He said he replied that the incident "smacked of police-state tactics" and suggested that the agency write to him.

He said later that he did not have "the faintest idea what they were talking about," but noted he had had a telephone conversation from San Francisco Tuesday with his office here about an F.B.I. question. The F.B.I.'s New York office declined comment on Mr. Lane's statement.

The New York lawyer is currently chairman of a private Citizens Committee of Inquiry, with offices at 156 Fifth Avenue, in the case. He was formerly retained by Oswald's mother.
