

Connally Discusses Nov. 22

AUSTIN (Tex.) —(UPI) — Gov. John B. Connally, who was gravely wounded by President Kennedy's assassin, said yesterday he basically agrees with the Warren Commission's conclusion that the assassination was the work of Lee Harvey Oswald alone.

Connally also agreed that Kennedy, and not he, was Oswald's main target on Nov. 22, 1963.

The only area in which the Governor indicated disagreement with the commission's finding was in the sequence of shots. The commission said the bullet that struck Kennedy in the throat probably also struck Connally.

"I'm convinced beyond any doubt that the first shot did not hit me," Connally said. "I heard the first shot and I looked back over my right shoulder to see him (Kennedy). All I could see was the blur of people moving."

"I felt the impact of the

second bullet but I did not hear it. The third shot I heard. I heard it hit him (Kennedy) and I saw the results of it.

"My eyes were open. I was conscious. I thought immediately that it was an assassination."

Connally added, however, that he could not "say categorically" that the commission was wrong in concluding that one bullet hit both the President and him.
