

Indictment Cites Gun Dealer Named at Senate Hearings

RALEIGH, N. C., Jan. 28 (AP) —Indictments charging violations of Federal firearms laws have been brought against two men linked in Senate testimony with a five-ton arms cache found at Fayetteville last year.

The indictments, which did not involve weapons found in the cache, were returned Monday by the grand jury of the Federal Eastern District Court at Raleigh.

Named were Earl V. Redick Sr., 45 years old, of Fayetteville, and George Demeo of Yonkers, N. Y. Mr. Redick operates the Pine State Gun Shop at Fayetteville. Mr. Demeo is a reputed weapons dealer.

Both were indicted on charges of failing to register as arms dealers, neglecting to register the weapons they offered for sale and failing to obtain a license to sell explosive devices.

Last October, a Senate investigator disclosed that retired Army Maj. Gen. Carl Turner had sold arms to the Fayetteville gun shop.
