Arms Cache Found In Home Is Linked

To Ex-C.I.A. Aide NYTIMES JUN 2.2 1971 PHILADELPHIA, June 21 (AP)—The police say that a col-lection of weapons and explo-sives seized in a raid on two homes yesterday belongs to a former employe of the Central Intelligence Agency. Cases of rifles, ammunition, knives, plastic explosives, semi-automatic machine guns, mor-tars and assorted munitions were stacked floor to ceiling in the basement home of George

automatic machine guns, mor-tars and assorted munitions were stacked floor to ceiling in the basement home of George Fassnacht, 35 years old, the police reported. Investigators said their rec-ords showed that Mr. Fass-nacht, a ballistic expert, was employed by the Philadelphia police from 1962 to 1967, when he left to join the C.I.A. The police said he had worked for the intelligence agency in Viet-nam and other overseas posts before resigning in 1969. He was last reported living in Hong Kong, they said. Acting on a tip from a re-pairman who noticed piles of wooden crates in the basement of a home owned by Mrs. Mary Tobin, the police raided the row dwelling at 3 a.m. They found a small arsenal there. Mrs. Tobin told the police that Mr. Fassnacht had brought the creates to her home three or four years ago. She said she had given him permission to store them without knowing their contents. The police, assisted by United States Treasury agents and Army Ordnance experts, went to the Fassnacht home, four miles to the north. There they removed tons of plastic explo-sives, 15-millimeter cannon projectiles, mortar shells, gre-nades and automatic weapons of many types. The police evacuated 12 neighboring homes and cor-doned off the thirt.
