Gerald Baker, who had been shot in the chest, was dead on arrival at a Miami hospital.

"He apparently was shot during a training maneuver in which live ammunition was used," Brown said.

The former Green Berets were identified as Edward Koldy, 33, and William J.

'Invasion Camp' In Everglades

Key West, Fla.

Police investigating a fatal shooting uncovered a secret military training base for Haitian exiles deep in the Everglades yes-terday and arrested two Americans said to be in charge of the camp.

Ten Haitians also were arrested.

Unofficial sources said the Americans were former members of the Green Berets - the Army's elite Special Force unit that specializes in guerrilla warfare training.

"They gave up without a fight," said Monroe County Sheriff Robert Brown, whose men confiscated 16 rifles, 16 pistols and a collection of knives.

Brown said his men bemiles from the nearest road.

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when Florida Highway Patrol troopers Tuesday stopped a car carrying a man who had been shot in the chest.

The man, identified as Gerald D. Baker, was dead on arrival at a Miami hospital.

"He apparently was shot during a training maneuver in which live ammo was used," Brown said.

IDENTIFICATION

The sheriff identified the Americans as Ed Koldy, 33, and William J. Dempsey, 26. He stated that the Americans were in charge of the camp.

Brown said the FBI had been notified and the U.S. Border Patrol was trying to determine whether the Haitians had entered the country illegally.

Last May, Haitian President Francois Duvalier's government said it had came aware of the camp, 50 smashed a 35-man force that miles west of Miami and two invaded Haiti.
