"Yankee reactionary newspapers" today of "waging a campaign of provocations against Cuba" aimed at "creating difficulties in the functioning of the Cuban mission at the United Nations."

The charge, made by the official newspaper, Granma, was Cuba's first reaction to reports published last week that the United States Government had denied re-entry visas to two members of the 17-man mission to the United Nations and thatfive other Cuba diplomats might not be allowed to return the next time they leave the country.

However, the editorial did directly deny the reported reasons: alleged intelligence activities and "financial and directional" aid to the Black Panther party, a militant group.
