Castro Reports a Landing Of Exile Force From U.S.

Fighting Said to Continue -Washington Denies Knowledge of Raid

MIAMI, April 19-Premier Fidel Castro announced today that a group of "mercenaries" landed in eastern Cuba on Friday and that Government troops were still fighting the invaders.

In a 270-word communiqué, broadcast by the Havana radio, Mr. Castro said that the landing took place some 15 miles east of Baracoa, in Oriente Province, on the eastern tip of Cuba across from Haiti.

The communiqué said that four soldiers were killed and two seriously wounded in clashes with the mercenaries. Two of the mercenaries were reported to have been killed and three captured.

U. S. Links Charged

Mr. Castro indicated that the mercenaries, who he said came from the United States, were Cuban exiles. He said they were equipped with "modern automatic Yankee army weapons."

[In Washington, the State Department said Sunday that no agency of the Government had any knowledge of an armed expedition mounted on United States territory for an attack on Cuba.]

The fact that the communiqué was signed by Mr. Castro,



operations against the invaders were continuing, appeared to indicate that the Cuban Government regarded the landing as a significant development.

In Miami, Andres Nazario Sargen, secretary general of Alpha 66, an exile "action group," said in a telephone interview that it was possible that the men who had landed in Cuba belonged to his organization.

Mr. Nazario emphasized that Alpha 66 did not have any operational base in the United States and that any actions against Cuba had been carried out from outside United States territory.

He declined to give more details about the landing. He said that to do so might jeopardize the men, who were being pursued by Cuban troops.

The landing coincided with the ninth anniversary of the ninth anniversary of the Bay of Pigs invasion in which a force of 1,600 exiles was defeated by Cuban soldiers in less than 72 hours.

Alpha 66 was formed in Februiary, 1962, in Miami by a group of 66 Cuban exiles and the Castro Government.

Mr. Castro's communiqué said that shortly after the landing at dawn on Friday, Government forces had made contact with the rebels and had captured two prisoners, two automatic weapons and plastic explosives.
