US Demands Cuba Give Up Captain

- The U.S. will demand the naturalized U.S. citizen. immediate return of Capt. Jose Villa, skipper of the Mi- received information that ami-based freighter seized by a Cuban gunboat, the White House said today.

Presidential press secretary Ronald Ziegler disclosed the U.S. determination to obtain the release of Villa after President Nixon met with Villa's wife, Isabelle, and her three children.

'Unconscionable'

"This act by Cuba is de-plorable," said Ziegler. "The fact that a Panamanian (registered) vessel was seized in this way is an unconscionable act by the Cuban government and it is an act that cannot be tolerated in the international community."

Ziegler said the U.S. has Villa is alive in Cuba. Several crewmen of the freighter were wounded in the attack, and at one point Villa radioed he was dying.

'A Violation'

Ziegler said that the U.S. will demand the return of Villa through the Swiss embassy in Havana, which handles U.S. affairs there.

Ziegler deplored seizure of the ship as "clearly a violation of international practice and the right of freedom of navigation."
