KLAN EX-DRAGON HELD IN CAROLINA

He and Nine Are Accused of Accessory After Murder

Special to The New York Times SUMTER, S. C., Sept. 17---<u>Robert E. Soggin</u>, former Ku Klux Klan grand dragon, was arrested by the state police to-day after he and nine klan associates had been charged with conspiracy to commit rob-bery and accessory after the fact of murder.

Tact of murder. The arrest grew out of a confrontation near here Sun-day night between a new klan organization formed by Mr. Scoggin and the rival United Klans of America. Mr. Scoggin lost his position as United Klan gran dragon while serving in gran dragon while serving in Federal prison for contempt of congress.

The imperial wizard of the United Klan is <u>Robert Shelton</u> of Alabama, who also served in prison on a contempt con-viction.

Willie L. Odom, 50 years old, who operated a small grocery store near here, was shot and killed Sunday night while leav-ing the rally of the Scoggins group, the Invisible Empire of the Ku Klux Klan, realm of

the Ku Klux Klan, realm of South Carolina. Mr. Scoggin became em-broiled in a struggle for klan leadership in South Carolina after his release from prison in January. He was succeeded as grand dragon by Harry Gilliam, a neighbor in Spartanburg.

More Warrants Due

Additional warrants will be Additional warrants will be issued, probably tomorrow, ac-cording to Sumter County Sher-iff I. Byrd Parnell. None of the 10 charged so far are Sumter County residents. Chief J. P. Strom of the State Jaw Enforcement Division co

Chief J. P. Strom of the State Law Enforcement Division co-ordinated with Sheriff Parnell's deputies in making arrests and in conducting the investigation leading to the warrants, Mr. Parnell said. In addition to Mr. Scoggin, others charged in warrants were Glenn Cook, James How-ard Kniphfer and Raymond Scott of Aiken, Charles L. Mur-phy of Enoree, Walter Elrod of Williamston, Preston Cox and Joe Turner of Florence, G. E. Pritchard of Laurens and Carl N. Wildes of Andrews.

By late afternoon Messrs. Scoggin, Kniphfer, Cox, Turner, Wildes, Murphy and Elrod had

According to Sheriff Parnell, who attended the rally Sunday night at the Sumter Raceway, security guards of the host klans attempted to take a tape recorder from Walter B. Brown of Sumter, a member of the rival United Klans. Mr. Brown kept the recorder but was told

of Sumter, a member of the rival United Klans. Mr. Brown kept the recorder but was told to leave. During a scuffle, a window in his car was smashed. As he drove to the exit, he was stopped by other klan security guards, who attacked him. Mr. Odom followed in another car with his wife and two sons. Sheriff Parnell says that wit-nesses saw the guards attempt to stop Mr. Odom, but he fired a .22-caliber pistol six times as he sped away. There was re-turn fire from the security guards, and a .38-caliber slug hit Mr. Odom in the back of the head, apparently killing him instantly. His car crashed into a ditch, and his wife suf-fered two cracked ribs. The boys, aged 12 and 17, escaped uninjured. "Nobody was hit, as far as we know," Sher-iff Parnell said of the shots fired by Mr. Odom. Mr. Brown, a used-car sales-man in Sumter. declined to

Mred by Mr. Odom. Mr. Brown, a used-car sales-man in Sumter, declined to comment today on the events of Sunday night. "I wouldn't even say if I was there or not," he said in a telephone inter-view from his home.
