Two men were indicted Wednesday by a federal grand jury in connection with the alleged illegal sale of \$1 worth of machine guns and sub machine guns.

RICHARD A. LAUCHLJ
of Collinsville was charged with interstate transportation of firearms and receipt of firearms by a convicted felon, Illinois manufacturer of firearms.

guns and sub machine guns to Lauuchill has been convicted in a firm near Wapella on May 19, before federal courts. On Oct. 1, Lauuchill was indicted for illegal possession of firearms and once in attempting to bribe a U.S. Treasury agent on Sept. 2 in an attempt to influence him not to sue Mclester, 49, of Bloomington, and Paul Gordon Jones, 35, of 4 Bloomington Heights. THE SUPPOSED buyer was son of a general rocket launcher owned by an agent of the Internal Revenue Service, who posed as a general in a South American country the government. He was tried for an alleged violation of the wagering tax law. Knack Lauuchill, 35, was given a two-year suspended sentence in Indiana. Both men are free on bond. In other indictments returned from a Provo, Utah, by the grand jury, two men purchase a gambling stamp and are to pay the wagering tax.

Two machine guns were charged with the robbery of the Farmers State Bank at Gerrard on May 28 in which \$10,867 were taken. Homer J. Von Lewellen of Kansas City, Kan., was considered partial to the bank and accepted the robbery as a trap. Some of the guns later recovered were delivered by Von Lewellen to a gunsmith for reconditioning, according to the bank employees with a report.
