Jerry Brooks, a former member of the Minutemen, testified here today in United States District Court that he had suggested to Robert B. DePugh, the rightwing group's national coordinator, that cyanide be put in the air-conditioning of the United Nations Building in New York City.

Mr. Brooks's testimony was made under cross examination by William Gilwee, a defense attorney for Mr. DePugh and two other co-defendants in the trial, Troy Houghton and Mr. Walter Patrick Peyson. The men are charged with violating the National Firearms Act. "Your trouble with Mr. DePugh started when you came up with the idea of putting cyanide in the air-conditioning unit of the U.N. Building?" asked Mr. Gilwee.

"No sir," replied Mr. Brooks. "Well, Idin't you advance the idea?" the lawyer asked.
