KANSAS CITY, Mo., Jan. 21 (AP)—Robert DePugh, leader of the Minutemen, was convicted by a Federal District Court jury today, of bond jumping. Sentencing will be deferred at least 25 days. He was returned to the Federal penitentiary at Leavenworth, Kan., where he is serving a one-year term on a Federal firearms violation. DePugh was charged with willful failure to appear for trial in the District Court on Dec. 3, 1968.

Minutemen Chief Quickly Found Guilty

KANSAS CITY (AP) — A U.S. district court jury took but 48 minutes yesterday to convict Robert Bolivar DePugh, leader of the Minutemen organization, on a charge of bond jumping.

The sentencing of DePugh, 46, of Norborne, Mo., will be deferred at least 25 days. He was returned to the federal penitentiary at Leavenworth, Kan., where he is serving a one-year term on a federal firearms violation.

The defense failed to call a witness even though it subpoenaed 11, including Jim Garrison, district attorney of Orleans Parish in Louisiana.

Robert Duncan, a defense attorney, said he thought there was enough reversible error in the trial that it can be won on appeal.

DePugh was charged with willful failure to appear for trial in U.S. District Court in Kansas City Dec. 3, 1968.
