39 GROUPS BEGIN A GUN CURB DRIVE

'Massive Write-In' Sought for Prompt Legislation

WASHINGTON, June 18 The backers of tougher gun con-trols organized a committee to-day to try to increase public pressure on Congress to pass such legislation.

Attorney General Ramsey Clark announced the formation of the committee after a meet-ing with officials of the Na-tional Council for a Responsible Eiroarme Bolicy and 28 other Firearms Policy and 38 other interested organizations.

The committee has strong support from remnants of the campaign of Senator Robert F. campaign of Senator Robert F. Kennedy of New York, who was shot to death on June 5. The effort is being made with the knowledge of his brother, Sena-tor Edward M. Kennedy of Mas-sachusetts, although the Kenne-dy family is not personally in-volved.

The new committee will op-erate as the Emergency Com-mittee for Gun Control of the National Council for a Respon-sible Firearms Policy. It hopes to enlist support from a wide range of organizations and could emerge as the nation's first viable antigun lobby if it succeeds.

The committee is actually an effort to merge the national council, formed last year by proponents of tougher gun con-trols, with a group of citizens who became greatly interested in the issue after Senator Ken-nedy's assassination

in the issue after Senator Ken-nedy's assassination. The organizing group will consist of James V. Bennett, former director of the United States Bureau of Prisons and President of the firearms coun-cil; John H. Sharon, a Wash-ington lawyer who was a law partner of Secretary of Defense Clark M. Clifford; and Earl Morris, president of the Ameri-can Bar Association. Mr. Sharon said the commit-

Mr. Sharon said the commit-tee would "aim to coordinate,

tee would "aim to coordinate, stimulate and organize a mas-sive write-in to Congressmen and Senators in support of the most effective gun control leg-islation possible before Con-gress goes home." Authoritative sources said that no agreement had been reached today on specifically what legislative goals the com-mittee would pursue. But they said the prevailing view was to push for the strongest legisla-tion now pending, which would provide for registration of fire-arms and licensing of gun own-ers. ers.

The sources said that Nicho-las Zumas, a Washington law-j yer who was active in the Ken-nedy campaign would probably be named executive director. The committee is seeking a man of national reputation to serve as national chairman.

as national reputation to serve as national chairman. Among the persons who be-came interested in the issue after Senator Kennedy's death was Philip M. Stern, a Wash-ington philanthropist, who en-listed Mr. Sharon and who plans to contribute to and so-licit funds for the campaign. The organizations that at-tended today's meeting with Mr. Clark were asked to sup-ply support, but they were not formally asked to affiliate with the committee. Such a request, along with a call for financing,

along with a call for financing, could come later.

could come later. Among those involved in the venture are Kennedy campaign workers in New York City and California, as well as Papert, Koenig, and Lois, a New York advertising agency that Mr. Kennedy had employed. Some members of Edward Kennedy's Senate staff are also taking part. part

part. The national council has been distributing gun control petitions throughout the nation with the hope of getting 10 mik-lion signatures by the end of this week. Cuncil officials es-timate they already had one million signatures and said they could not keep up with the flow. flow.
