# Oswald Not in 1963 Million-Name Secret Service File

Special to The New York Times WASHINGTON, May 12-The Secret Service had one million names in its index file of potential threats to Presidents at the ine President Kennedy was as-assinated Nov. 22, 1963, ac-ording to documents available uday at the National Archives.
