VIENNA, AUSTRIA, NOV. 25 (AP)-EASTERN EUROPE'S COMMUNIST COMMENTATORS SOUGHT TODAY TO CONVEY THE IDEA THAT PRESIDENT JOHNSON WILL COME UNDER PRESSURE FROM "RIGHTISTS" AND "RACISTS."

HUNGARIAN RADIO LISTENERS WERE TOLD THE NEW U.S. PRESIDENT FACES "MISTRUST AMONG THE PEOPLE OF NEW YORK BECAUSE HE IS A SOUTHERNER," AND THAT HE "REFRAINED FROM TAKING SIDES IN THE DEBATE BETWEEN KENNEDY AND THE OPPONENTS OF NEGRO REFORMS."

RADIO PRAGUE ASSERTED JOHNSON'S ACCESSION MEANT "A CERTAIN RETREAT TO THE RIGHT" IN DOMESTIC AND FOREIGN POLICY. COMMENTATOR SAID JOHNSON TOOK A LESS ANALYTICAL APPROACH TO FOREIGN POLITICAL PROBLEMS THAN KENNEDY AND ONE ADDED: "IN MANY RESPECTS, JOHNSON IS MUCH MORE A POLITICIAN THAN KENNEDY."

RADIO BRATISLAVA, IN SLOVAKIA, SAID "THE FUTURE WILL SHOW WHETHER JOHNSON IS CAPABLE OF STANDING UP TO THE ATTACKS OF THE RIGHTIST EXTREMISTS."

BULGARIAN RADIO SAID "REACTIONARY CIRCLES" IN THE UNITED STATES WERE PRESSING THE NEW PRESIDENT TO ABANDON THE POLICY OF "PEACEFUL COEXISTENCE."
