CASTRO CALLS DEATH 'BAD NEWS' FOR CUBA

MIAMI, Nov. 24 — Premier Fidel Castro warned Cuba last night that the assassination of President Kennedy was "grave and bad news from the political point of view." He said it could change United States foreign policy "from bad to worse."

In a two-hour radio and television address, the Cuban leader gave what he called an "objective analysis of facts, consequences and repercussions" that the assassination might have.

His views, he said, represented the opinion of his associates.

Dr. Castro called the news "grave and bad" in spite of the fact that, as he said, "we have been victims of constant hostility on the part of the U. S. and among the leaders of the U.S., great responsibility for these acts fell on President Kennedy."
