Government Goes After JFK Gun

DALLAS—(UPI)—The fed eral government put adver tisements in newspapers yes day in a first step toward establishing ownership of the mail-order rifle with which Lee Harvey Oswald assassinated President Kennely.

The newspaper ads said al claimants of the rifle mus file a claim and post a \$25 bond with the U. S. Treasury Assistant U. S. Atty Tim Timmons said.

The advertisements wirun weekly for three consecutive weeks and also wibe addressed to claimants of the 38-caliber pistol that kille Policeman J. D. Tippitt.

Tippitt was shot to deat while trying to question Os wald a few minutes after the assassination.

Claimants will be given 30 days after the last advertisement appears to file claims. If nobody files a claim within the time limit, the Treasury will declare the weapons forfeited to the government.

The weapons are now at the FBI office in Dallas.

Examiner appears alone in reporting as fact the alleged appearance of the ad. No substantiation found elsewhere for this. Examiner, which knocks dates off wire service stories and denotes times by "yesterday, today, tomorrow," etc., appears to have rewritten a story originally done in the future tense, and in converting it to its usage changed the language to the past tense and thus treated as accomplished fact something that was merely expected to happen.

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
