KING FILED HIS FIRST SUIT IN DENVER LAST MAY, SAYING HE HAD PURCHASED THE WEAPONS FROM THE WIDOW OF LEE HARVEY OSWALD AND HAD A BILL OF SALE.

IN HIS ANSWER, KING ASSERTED THAT HE PAID MRS. OSWALD, NOW MRS. KENNETH PORTER, \$10,000 IN CASH AND AGREED TO PAY AN ADDITIONAL \$35,000 UPON DELIVERY OF THE GUNS.
