John J. King lost his bid today to be paid for the rifle

The award for the pistol
was not connected with the
abandonment question, since day to be paid for the rifle used to assassinate President John F. Kennedy. A federal court jury ruled Lee Harvey Oswald aban-

doned the rifle after the Dallas shooting and therefore King could not have pur-chased it from Oswald's wid-

The jury, in a verdict reached Friday and opened to-day, set the value of the Ital-The ian mail-order rifle at zero.

The panel of three women and nine men awarded King \$350 for the .38-caliber pistol used to kill Dallas patrolman J. D. Tippitt following the Kennedy slaying.

King had paid Mrs. Marina Oswald \$10,000 for the weap-ons and the right to exhibit them, and Mrs. Oswald was to get another \$35,000 once

King actually got possession of the weapons.

After the contract was signed, Congress passed a law making the guns part of the national archives and specifying owners of the property would receive "just compen-sation."

King filed suit, seeking \$5 million for the two guns. He testified during the trial last week that as a gun collector he valued the rifle at \$450,000, although Oswald paid \$21.45 for it.

The government contended Oswald abandoned the rifle and therefore Mrs. Oswald had no claim on it or authority to sell it. The jury upheld this view.
