RUBY - A BROODER WITH CRAZY BRAVADO

Dallas - [Ruby] has an old friend of some eight years' standing a man named George Senator, who operates a postcard peddling business.

Ruby ... had been living alone with his four dachhunds until about two months ago. Then George Senator came to share his apartment with him.

.... Mr. Senator talked with reporters inside ... police headquarters. ... He had gone there voluntarily with James Martin, a lawyer, after hearing the stunning news.

The two men had difficulty in getting into the building because police security was extremely tight at this stage. After indentifying themselves to the police, they had stopped briefly to talk with the newsmen. But two policemen grabbed Mr. Senator and whisked him away for interrogation, leaving Mr. Martin standing there futilely trying to gain admission to the interrogation room.

.... It is interesting that after he [Ruby] was arrested no less than six lawyers appeared at the police station, ready to represent him if he indicated he wanted them.
