Ruby's Angry Charge

'People in High Places Hid Facts'

Jack Ruby asserted yesterday that "people in high places" have sought to suppress facts about the assassination of President Kennedy and following events. He did not name the persons.

Ruby talked with reporters when he was brought into court for a hearing seeking disqualification of Judge Joe B. Brown from his case.

Brown was the trial judge when Ruby was convicted and sentenced to death for killing President Kennedy's presumed assasin, Lee Harvey Oswald.

Defense lawyers maintain that a yet-unpublished book by Brown about the Ruby case indicates that the judge had a pecuniary interest in the trial and therefore his rulings were not valid.

Ruby claimed that the true facts surrounding the assassination will never be revealed because "unfortunately some people in high places had so much to gain by putting me in this position."

He frequently interrupted himself to ask reporters if he appeared to be insane. A sanity trial has been ordered for him.

Pressed to elaborate about his "people in high places" remark, Ruby gave as an example the fact that the results of a polygraph test given him in jail under supervision of Chief Justice Earl Warren has not been divulged.

Ruby said: "After Warren spent nine hours with me,—and this is very important—and asked me numerous questions about my association with people, the Warren report refused to divulge the results of the polygraph because they said I did not know the difference between right and wrong."

Ruby said his mind has not deteriorated since he has been in jail, but rather has matured.
