Dallas, Tex., March 17 (AP)- Prosecutors have asked Dist. Judge Louis Holland to inquire into delays in sending the record of a Jack Ruby hearing to the Texas Court of Criminal Appeals.

Ruby is the former Dallas strip-tease joint operator who shot and killed Lee Harvey Oswald, assassin of President John F. Kennedy.

Dist. Atty. Henry Wade filed a motion yesterday asking for a hearing to determine if Ruby lawyers had "good cause" in not filing the record of a Sept. 9, 1965, habeas corpus hearing.

Ruby's lawyer, Phil Burleson, said recently that much of the delay was caused by corrections necessitated by numerous errors in the transcript. Burleson said he would ask the appeals court to hear the matter immediately on completion and correction of the transcript.

Wade's motion states that on Nov. 10, 1965, the court reporter prepared a statement of facts, Holland approved it the same day and it was delivered to Burleson.

Defense lawyers, the motion continued, have never submitted the record to the district attorney although Wade's office was satisfied with the accuracy of the copy.
