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DALLAS, TEX., DEC. 21 (AP)-DOCTORS SAID THAT JACK RUBY  
"APPEARS SOMEWHAT LESS STRONG TODAY" IN ISSUING THEIR MID-MORNING  
HOSPITAL BULLETIN TODAY CONCERNING HIS CANCER CASE.

THEY REPORTED THAT TUBES REMAIN IN HIS CHEST AND "ARE DRAINING  
ADEQUATELY."

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DALLAS, TEX., DEC. 21 (AP)-JACK RUBY, STRICKEN WITH CANCER, IS REPORTED TO BE RECEIVING CHEMICAL TREATMENTS WELL.

PHYSICIANS AT PARKLAND HOSPITAL, WHERE HE IS CONFINED UNDER GUARD, SAID YESTERDAY HIS CONDITION WAS UNCHANGED AND HE WAS RESTING.

THE 55-YEAR-OLD FORMER DALLAS NIGHT CLUB OPERATOR HAS BEEN IN SERIOUS CONDITION SINCE BEING TAKEN TO THE HOSPITAL FROM HIS COUNTY JAIL CELL DEC. 9.

RUBY WAS CONVICTED OF THE NOV. 24, 1963 SLAYING OF LEE HARVEY OSWALD, IDENTIFIED BY THE WARREN COMMISSION AS THE ASSASSIN OF PRESIDENT JOHN F. KENNEDY. THE CONVICTION WAS THROWN OUT ON APPEAL AND RUBY AWAITS A NEW TRIAL.

# Ruby Weakening

## Dallas

Doctors treating cancer-stricken Jack Ruby admitted for the first time yesterday that Ruby was weakening. In a short mid-morning hospital bulletin, a hospital spokes-

man said Ruby appeared "somewhat less strong."

Dr. Eugene Frenkel, head of the team administering chemotherapy to Ruby, said, however, that Ruby's weakening "is very minute and

difficult to see."

Frenkel said tests revealed the drugs being given Ruby in an attempt to starve the cancer cells had apparently touched off some hemorrhaging in the patient's intestines, and Ruby might require blood transfusions.
