New York, Jan. 2 (AP)- Jack Ruby has recorded a statement in which he repeats that there was no conspiracy involved in his killing of Lee Harvey Oswald, named by the Warren Commission as the assassin of President John. F. Kennedy.

Elmer Gertz, one of Ruby's legal team, said in a telephone interview from Chicago tonight that the recording was made secretly in Parkland Memorial Hospital, Dallas, where Ruby is gravely ill of cancer.

He said Ruby's denial takes up three minutes of a 46-minute long-playing Capitol record called "The Assassination" which also features the voices of other persons who played leading roles in the drama.

A spokesman for Capitol Records said the record would be played publicly for the first time at a news conference in New York tomorrow.

Among others on the recording are the late President, Gov. John Connally of Texas, Oswald, and members of the Dallas police force.

Profits from the recording will go to the Kennedy Library in Cambridge, Mass., Gertz said.

In an exclusive report by the Associated Press Dec. 19, Ruby was described as praying that he be given a final lie detector test so that people would be convinced there was no conspiracy involved in his killing of Oswald. He maintained then that he never knew Oswald and that the killing was a blank in his mind.

Gertz said Ruby repeated these statements on the recording.

Gertz said a representative of Capitol Records approached members of the Ruby family about two weeks ago and told them such a record would be an important contribution to history.

Ruby's brother, Earl, went to the hospital and the dying man agreed, Gertz said. Earl Ruby then brought an inconspicuous recorder into the hospital room and his brother made the statement into it.
