WASHINGTON, FEB. 15 (AP)-THE SUPREME COURT FORMALLY DISMISSED FROM ITS DOCKET TODAY AN APPEAL BY JACK RUBY CLAIMING HE WAS NOT TRIED FAIRLY FOR THE SLAYING OF LEE HARVEY OSWALD.

RUBY DIED OF CANCER IN DALLAS, JAN. 3. THREE MONTHS EARLIER

RUBY WAS CONVICTED OF MURDER WITH MALICE IN 1984. A NATIONWIDE TELEVISION AUDIENCE HAD SEEN THE 55-YEAR-OLD NIGHT CLUB OWNER FIRE AT OSWALD AS HE WAS BEING TRANSFERRED FROM A DALLAS POLICE STATION TO THE COUNTY JAIL NOV. 24, 1983, DAYS AFTER THE ASSASSINATION OF PRESIDENT JOHN F. KENNEDY.

OSWALD WAS NAMED BY THE WARREN COMMISSION AS KENNEDY'S ASSASSIN.

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
