RETURNED TO DUTIES

Since the demotion, he has returned to duties as a regular agent handling routine out-of-the-office investigative chores. Another agent was promoted to replace him as supervisor.

The demotion meant a drop in pay of more than \$1,000 a year for the Dallas agent.

On Nov. 22, and for several years before that, he was in charge of internal subversion investigations in the Dallas office.

The New Orleans agent, as a subversion expert, conducted the New Orleans aspects of the Oswald investigation. His part in the case is mentioned on page 437 of the Warren Commission report which was released Sunday.

Sources said the FBI ordered the agent transferred to Springfield, Ill. in April, but that he declined the move. Since he had the required time to be eligible for retirement, he retired from the FBI rather than go to Springfield.

According to the Warren Report, neither agent testified before the commission nor gave descriptions.
