Ousted F.B.I. Man's Plea Is Refused by High Court

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WASHINGTON, Nov. 9 (AP)

—The Supreme Court refused today to rule on a complaint by an agent of the Federal Bureau of Investigation that he was improperly dismissed for writing letters to Congressmen that, the bureau said, contained untrue statements.

The agent, William W. Turner, was dismissed in July, 1961, in a dispute over his assignment to duty at Oklahoma City. He questioned the advisability of the assignment and his superiors ordered an investigation that resulted in a 30-day suspension. Mr. Turner then wrote two letters to Congressmen.

The appeal questioned if an agency of the executive department of the Government might discharge an employe "where the discharge is predicated upon statements of the employe to members of Congress in petitions for redress of grievances."
