Bank Robbery Suspect Insists He'll Speak Only to the F.B.I.

A 21-year-old bank robbery suspect startled his police captors yesterday by insisting that "I ain't talking to nobody but the F.B.I."

The suspect, Clarence Overton of 285 Lexington Avenue, in the Bedford-Stuyvesant section of Brooklyn, was seized with \$4,000 the police said he had stolen from a Chemical Bank branch at 401 Flatbush Avenue. The police charged that he was the same person who used the similar note-passing method to make off with \$6,100 last month from the same bank branch.

Yesterday's incident began shortly before 11 A.M., when

the suspect entered the bank and aroused the suspicions of the bank manager, who had noticed that it was his second visit of the morning.

While the manager was looking for help on the street, Overton came running out the door and headed in the direction of the Grand Army Plaza. A patrolman, Allen Silver of the 61st Precinct, spotted the suspect and his pursuers.

Patrolman Silver left his car and caught up to the suspect who, when taken to the station, remained mute, except to say he would talk only to a representative of the Federal Bureau of Investigation.
