"In the search for a nominee for the F.B.I. directorship, we urged consideration to the highly qualified professionals with impeccable credentials of integrity within the organiza-tion itself. "We do not suggest there are not many other highly qualified leaders of proven integrity, but at this critical time it is es-sential that the F.B.I. not floun-der or lose direction in its service to the nation because of the lack of law enforcement expertise or of other qualities essential to the F.B.I. director-ship."
