An Agent Dissents on Need

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For F.B.I. Man as Director
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WASHINGTON, May 1 (AP)
—While most of the F.B.I.'s
top officials are reported in
agreement that the agency's
permanent director should be
an F.B.I. career man, at least
one disagrees.

Leonard Walters, an assistant director, released a telegram yesterday that he said
was endorsed by the acting associate director, all assistant directors and all special agents in
charge. It asked President Nixon to consider promoting an
official of the Federabl Bureau
of Investigation into the director's post instead of naming
another outsider.

While the telegram was
signed "All F.B.I. Officials,"
Wallace Estill, long-time director of the Knoxville, Tenn., office, said today he did not agree
entirely that the permanent director should be a career man.

Mr. Estill said he had refused
to sign the telegram. An agent
for 31 years, Mr. Estill said he
had sent his own telegram to
Mr. Nixon saying that in addition to current F.B.I. officials,
"others of integrity with expertise in law enforcement" should
be considered for the directorship.
